ANNUAL REPORT 2021

Dear Members

Assalamualaikum

Tam once more privileged to submit to you the annual report for the year 2021.

I wish to thank all of you and all our Brothers and Sisters in every part of the island who, for years now, have been placing your trust in the Foundation by regularly contributing in our fund. This has enabled us to relieve the hardship and sufferings of the less fortunate, to enable a few unemployed to secure a gainful employment, to contribute towards providing some others with a decent accommodation. The Foundation has also extended its assistance to those who have contracted debts for worthwhile purposes and those who require medical treatment. Above all, the funds you have entrusted to us have been used to alleviate poverty by providing educational opportunities at all levels, particularly at tertiary levels, to children and youngsters from modest families.

I wish also to extend my thanks to my colleagues of the Management Committee for their constant support and guidance and to our staff for their devotion and hard work

A summary of the assistance granted in 2021 EDUCATION AND TRAINING

a. Tertiary

(38 students completed their studies in 2021.)

60 students attending courses in tertiary institutions in Mauritius received grants

6 students studying in France, 8 in other European countries, 4 in Australia, 3 in UK, 12 in Canada and USA, 5 in South Africa, 2 in India, 14 in Malaysia, 1 in Pakistan, 2 in Singapore, received financial assistance to enable them to pursue their studies.

b. Secondary

38 SC & HSC students received grants for their tuition from the Foundation in 2021. I am pleased to report that some of these students did brilliantly in their respective examinations.

HOUSING FOR THE POOR

77 families received **housing assistance** in **2021** to complete a **modest** house or to acquire an NHDC / low-cost apartment.

Exceptionally this year, a patron of IWF sponsored extensive repairs of **2** houses and the construction of a brand new one. All three for very modest families.

JOB CREATION

32 persons were given tools /equipment or funds to enable them to work and earn a living

DEBTS / HARDSHIP

152 persons who had contracted debts for worthwhile purposes or who had been victims of some **tragic events** were offered assistance.

MEDICAL ASSISTANCE

Our medical unit continued to provide medical services to needy families. Also 95 patients received financial assistance for medical treatment locally or abroad.

FOODSCHEME

There were 325 monthly food recipients island-wide in 2021

CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY (CSR)

Our thanks go to all the companies which have contributed to our CSR fund in 2021. Our CSR projects, as has been explained in previous annual reports, are education- & training-based.

The **Foundation** continued to take charge of the education cost of the vulnerable pupils of 2 preprimary schools situated in deprived areas.

- 1. Textbooks were given to 25 secondary school students.
- 18 students enrolled in local tertiary institutions received grants to enable them to proceed with their studies.
